During this week you will explore a topic of the Civil War in more depth by producing an inclass project. You may work alone or choose no more than two other classmates to complete this assignment. You or your group will choose a topic to explore and a project format. You will be given a wide array of choices and projects formats; it is recommended that you choose a format that reflects your interest and abilities.

The following are products formats that are available:

- Write a poem (16-24 Lines) or series of poems
- Perform a skit (At least 5 minutes long)
- Create a newspaper/newsletter with different stories and columns about Civil War topics
- Create a radio interview with a figure from the Civil War
- Create a web page/site
- Create a trivia/board game
- Create an illustrated informational mini poster
- Write a series of letters from a soldier's point of view
- If you have another project idea, you're more than welcome to propose it for approval.
